The purpose of Young Enterprise's 2024-2030 Transforming Futures Strategy is to make a measurable long-term contribution to improving the futures of young people facing barriers to opportunities.

Specifically, we are aiming to increase young people's engagement in education, improve preparedness for the world of work and help increase social mobility.

WHAT WE PLAN TO DO



Create more opportunities for young people to apply their learning to address practical, real-world challenges. Applied learning has been shown to boost attainment, attendance and attitudes to learning, improving students' learning outcomes as well as building key transferable skills for the workplace.

This means that young people are more prepared for the world of work, boosting the UK's labour market and addressing skills gaps. The earlier young people learn how to apply their learning, the greater the compounding effect, impacting their families and communities, ultimately boosting labour market productivity.



Integrate YE's unique blend of financial and enterprise opportunities to enable young people to learn to earn and look after their money, as well as being more equipped to achieve and sustain successful transitions at key points in their lives, like securing their first job or living independently.

We will continue working closely with schools and colleges to support educators and build learner pathways across YE's programmes and services over multiple years, so that young people benefit throughout their time in education, creating longer-lasting and deeply embedded behaviours and habits, rather than one-off interactions.



Prioritise resources for young people furthest from opportunity. While
recognising applied learning is beneficial
to all young people, we believe it is important
to prioritise our resources to increase access
for those experiencing the greatest barriers,
because this is where we see the biggest impact.

Our programmes and services have been designed to achieve learning outcomes which contribute to improved social mobility, and this extends to measuring the long-term impact of our work and supporting YE alumni in their early careers.

We believe there is a **red thread between opportunities, skills, productivity and social mobility**, and significant benefits can be unlocked for everyone *if* young people facing the greatest barriers are prioritised for sustained support and opportunities.

OUR IMPACT AIMS



YE will improve young people's attitude to learning, attendance and attainment

through applied learning. YE topics are relatable, enjoyable and capture the imagination, helping young people to see the purpose of what they learn in the classroom. Three-quarters (74%) of teachers surveyed think YE increases students' engagement in their learning. By increasing engagement in this way, young people become more present in their education which has positive effects on their broader learning outcomes.



YE will help young people to become

real-world ready. Forming ambitions starts from a very young age, yet opportunities to pursue their aspirations are inconsistent and favour some over others. YE learning experiences fill gaps in knowledge, attitudes and skills that can make a real difference to young people's life choices. Whether or not they choose entrepreneurship as a career, YE lets young people give it a go, develop an enterprising mindset, build confidence and adopt a responsible attitude towards money.



YE will improve young people's social

mobility prospects through opportunities targeted towards those facing barriers and in more disadvantaged communities. YE provides a pathway for aspiring entrepreneurs and leaders of all backgrounds and offers prioritised support for those who might otherwise rule themselves out. Through our Inspiring Futures programme, we track learners' progress across several key measures that have a known impact in contributing to improved social mobility.



YE will have long-lasting benefits for

those who take part, including being more likely to earn an above-average salary and less likely to be NEET (not in employment, education or training). By supporting young people during their early careers, the positive impact of YE can be sustained through them giving back to their communities and volunteering to share their experiences with others. By helping to close essential skills gaps (estimated to be worth £22bn) and improve social mobility, YE can have a significant positive impact on labour market productivity and growth in the broader economy.
